## **NOTICE TO ELIGIBLE ATHLETES:**

The 2026 Youth Olympic Games will be held in Dakar, Senegal. The environment may be considered difficult for some. Please note that dorm rooms may be shared with other countries, bathrooms and showers will be dormitory style (located outside of the bedroom and shared), toilets may be eastern style (squat toilets), housing will not have air conditioning or access to ice, and offsite housing for family/friends will likely be over an hour drive from the Athlete Village. Temperatures will range from 75-90 degrees F. Mosquitos are prevalent and the USOPC is recommending multiple vaccines.

USA Archery recognizes that the environment may not be conducive to all athletes. ## **SECTION 1: OVERVIEW**

These procedures outline the pathway for selection by USA Archery to the 2026 Youth Olympic Games (Games) to be held in Dakar, Senegal. Team size will be two (2) athletes, made up of one (1) male recurve archer and one (1) female recurve archer. **Should countries decline their quotas, there is a possibility of the U.S. being allocated additional quotas.** World Archery quotas are awarded to the United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee (USOPC) and are gender specific.

## **SECTION 2: ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS**

1. Nationality/Passports Requirements:
  - Have a valid United States passport at the time of nomination that does not expire for six months after the conclusion of the Games.
2. Minimum International Olympic Committee (IOC) Requirements:
  - Abide by the rules in the Olympic Charter, including nationality/citizenship requirements.
    - For additional information regarding an athlete who is a national of two or more countries, has changed his or her nationality or acquired a new nationality, refer to the

[Olympic Charter](#) (Rule 41).

- Abide by the IOC Eligibility of Conditions Form/Conditions of Participation Form.
3. Local Organizing Committee (LOC) Requirements:
- Comply with all rules and policies implemented by the LOC for the Games.
4. International Federation (IF) Requirements:
- Comply with all World Archery eligibility requirements which will be posted here once available: <https://www.olympics.com/ioc/documents/olympic-games/youth-olympic-games>
5. USOPC Requirements:
- Comply with all USOPC rules applicable to the Games (e.g., Demonstrations).
  - Complete all USOPC Games Registration requirements by the stated deadline.
    - **Long List deadline: July 1, 2026**
  - Comply with the USOPC Delegation Terms, including the Conduct Requirements, which will be communicated to athletes nominated to the Youth Olympic Games.
  - Comply with the [USOPC Athlete Safety Policy](#) and the [U.S. Center for SafeSport Code](#) including education and training requirements.
  - Comply with the current [USOPC Background Check Policy](#).
6. USA Archery Requirements:
- Comply with the [USA Archery Athlete Agreement](#).
  - Comply with the [USA Archery Code of Conduct Policy](#).
  - Comply with the [USA Archery Safe Sport Policy and Background Screen Criteria and Review Policy](#).
  - Athlete must have current USA Archery membership (eligible member type required).
  - All participants entering the 2026 Youth Olympic Games U.S. Team Trials must register in the U18 Recurve division for both the Youth Olympic Games U.S. Trials event and the JOAD Target Nationals and JOAD U.S. Open event by the published registration deadlines.
  - Athlete does not have an active suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Games and it not listed on the USA Archery Organizational Exclusion List (OEL).
  - Athlete does not have an active sanction for an anti-doping rule/policy violation that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Games.

### **SECTION 3: OTHER MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE TEAM**

- Agree to be bound by and adhere to all USA Archery, World Archery, WADA, USADA and USOPC anti-doping protocols, policies and procedures, as applicable. This includes participation in Out-of-Competition Testing and an agreement to be bound to the results management authority of World Archery, WADA, USADA, or other Anti-Doping Organization as applicable.
- Meet all health and safety protocols, to include vaccine requirements and/or testing requirements set forth by the government, local laws, USOPC, World Archery and/or the LOC.
- To be eligible to participate in the 2026 Youth Olympic Games, athletes must have been born between 1 January 2009 and 31 December 2011.
- To be eligible for selection to a quota place, athletes must have obtained the Minimum Qualification Score (MQS) at a National or World Archery sanctioned event between 1 July ~~January~~ 2025 and 31 ~~July~~ 7 August 2026. The MQS requirements are listed below:

## SECTION 5: NOMINATION PROCESS

### 5.1 TOTAL QUOTA PLACES:

The U.S. was awarded two (2) country quotas – one (1) male and one (1) female quota for recurve archery. If USA Archery fields a full team, these athletes will compete in both the Individual and Mixed Team events.

### 5.2 EVALUATION EVENT QUALIFICATION PATHWAY:

The 2026 Youth Olympic Games U.S. Team Trials will be held in conjunction with the 2026 JOAD Target Nationals and JOAD U.S. Open event, July 23-26, 2026 in Lincoln, NE.

All event names, dates and locations will be announced at least 45 days prior to the event and will be posted on the [USA Archery website](#). As event details are subject to change, athletes are encouraged to regularly check the calendar of events to ensure they are current with any schedule changes. The 2026 Youth Olympic Games U.S. Team Trials will be held in conjunction with the 2026 JOAD Target Nationals and JOAD U.S. Open event. Information for this event can be located [here](#). USA Archery will inform athletes of any changes made that are outside of the 45-day window via email and will also post schedule updates online as soon as the changes are known.

The 2026 Youth Olympic Games U.S. Team Trials will be an open event, and athletes will need to meet all necessary registration requirements listed above prior to the start of competition.

## **SECTION 9: REMOVAL OF ATHLETES FROM THE TEAM**

### **9.1 USA ARCHERY JURISDICTION**

- a. USA Archery has jurisdiction over athlete nominees until athlete entries have been submitted by the USOPC to the LOC. An athlete who is nominated to the Team may be removed for any of the following reasons, as determined by USA Archery:
  - i. Voluntary withdrawal. Athlete submits a written letter to the USA Archery High Performance Director ([highperformance@usarchery.org](mailto:highperformance@usarchery.org)) requesting to voluntarily withdraw from the Team.
  - ii. Injury or illness. A physician (or medical staff) approved by USA Archery provides certification that the Athlete has a debilitating condition. If Athlete refuses to provide verification of their illness or injury by a physician (or medical staff), their injury will be assumed to be debilitating, and they may be removed from the Team.
  - iii. Failure to participate. Athlete does not participate in all Mandatory Training and/or Competition as defined in these procedures.
  - iv. Code of Conduct Violation. Athlete violates the [USA Archery Code of Conduct Policy](#)

- v. Athlete Agreement. Athlete violates a term in their signed USA Archery Athlete Agreement.
  - vi. Non-compliance. Athlete does not meet the athlete eligibility requirements listed in Section 2 and Section 3 of these selection procedures.
  - vii. Violation of USA Archery's Intent to Compete Form.
- b. An Athlete may be removed as a nominee to the Team or from the Team if found to have violated World Archery, WADA, USADA and/or USOPC anti-doping protocol, policies and procedures, the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code, the USOPC Athlete Safety Policy and the USA Archery SafeSport and Background Screen Criteria and Review Policy, as applicable.

## 9.2 USOPC JURISDICTION

- a. Once Athlete entries have been submitted by the USOPC to the LOC, the USOPC has jurisdiction over the Team.
- b. USOPC's Delegation Conduct Requirements apply in addition to the USA Archery Code of Conduct. The Delegation Conduct Requirements in the USOPC Games Delegation Terms are specific to each Games and are made available during the Games registration process.
- c. The USOPC's Grievance Procedures and Hearing Process are found within the USOPC Dispute Resolution Policy and Hearing Procedures.
  - i. See USOPC Dispute Resolution for more information.

## SECTION 10: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS PRIOR TO SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE LOCAL ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

- 10.1** Should a vacancy occur prior to submission of Entries by Name to the LOC, USA Archery will select the next highest finisher from the 2026 YOG U.S. Team Trials from the category of the vacant spot.
- 10.2** All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Sections 2-3.

## SECTION 11: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS AFTER SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE LOCAL ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

- 11.1** Should a vacancy occur after submission of Entries by Name to the LOC, if allowed by the LOC and Late Athlete Replacement Policy, USA Archery will, if possible, seek to fill the position with the next highest finisher from the 2026 YOG U.S. Team Trials from the category of the vacant spot.
- 11.2** All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Sections 2-3.

## SECTION 12: RIGHT TO A HEARING

An athlete who is removed from the Team has the right to a hearing per the USA Archery's Disciplinary Proceedings and Grievance Policy and the USOPC Bylaws (applies only for a Protected Competition), Section 9 (USOPC Dispute Resolution).

## SECTION 14: DISCLAIMERS

These procedures are based on IOC and World Archery rules and regulations as presently known and understood. Any change in the selection procedures caused by a change in IOC and/or World Archery rules and regulations will be distributed to the affected athletes immediately. The selection criteria are based on the latest information available to USA Archery.

However, the selection criteria are always subject to unforeseen, intervening circumstances, and realistically may not have accounted for every possible contingency. If any force of nature, pandemic, or force majeure, should cause the alteration or cancellation of any of the selection events listed in this document, these selection procedures may require revisions.

## SECTION 15: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

All members of the Selection Committee (Section 6.3) and all individuals who developed these selection procedures (Section 20) must comply with the [USA Archery Conflict of Interest Policy](#), to include completing and submitting a disclosure form consistent with the USA Archery Conflict of Interest Policy before convening the committee.

## SECTION 18: NON-RETALIATION

The USOPC and USA Archery have zero tolerance for retaliation against people who make good faith reports of potential ethical, policy, or legal violations, or who cooperate with investigations of those reports. That means no USOPC or USA Archery staff, Board or Committee member, or volunteer may threaten, harass, discriminate against, or take any negative employment or related action (e.g., discharge, demotion, suspension, negative review) on that basis.

## APPENDIX A

### ATHLETE SELECTION PROCEDURES RECURVE

#### 2026 Youth Olympic Games (YOG) - U.S. Team Trials Schedule

The trials will be conducted in conjunction with the 2026 JOAD Target Nationals and JOAD U.S. Open event, July 23-26 in Lincoln, NE. More specifically, the U.S. Team Trials will be held in conjunction with the [JOAD Target Nationals event](#).

#### SHOOTING SCHEDULE SUBJECT TO CHANGE

##### 1. Event Format

- 72-Arrow Round #1
- 72-Arrow Round #2

1.1 Archers will shoot 72-arrow Round #1 and 72-arrow #2 at a distance of 60M.

1.2 Archers will be ranked based on their total combined cumulative score from 72-Arrow Round #1 and 72-Arrow Round #2.

1.3 A tie for any position within the top 8 from the combined cumulative score from 72-Arrow Round #1 and 72-Arrow Round #2 will be broken by the total number of X's followed by the total number of 10's. Following, if there are still ties within the top 3, the tie(s) will be broken with a single arrow shoot-off.

1.4 Upon conclusion of 72 Arrow Round #1 and 72 Arrow Round #2 and resolution of any ties, all scores will be considered final and U.S. Team Trials final rankings assigned.

##### 2. Team Selection

**Eligible athletes will be selected to the 2026 Youth Olympic Games Team based on the results of the 2026 Youth Olympic Games U.S. Team Trials final rankings.**

2.1 The top one (1) male and female archers in the U.S. Team Trials - Recurve will be named to the 2026 Youth Olympic Games Team.

2.1.1 In the event additional quota slots are awarded USA Archery will invite the next archer based on the U.S. Team Trials final rankings.

2.1.2 **Mixed Team: If only one male and one female are named to the team, these two athletes will compete in the mixed team event.**

2.1.2.1 **Should more than one athlete be named to the team, priority will be given to the male and/or female with the highest 72-Arrow Round score at the Youth Olympic Games. Ties will be broken by number of X's then 10's. Should a tie remain, the highest finisher from the Youth Olympic Games U.S. Team Trials will be nominated to the Mixed Team.**

2.2 All athletes selected to the Team will receive an accept/decline email from USA Archery with additional information about the event.

2.3 In the event an archer declines their position on the Team, the next highest ranked archer of

similar gender will be invited based on the U.S. Team Trials final rankings.

### 3. Additional Rules

- 3.1 World Archery (WA) Rules will apply for all portions of the YOG U.S. Team Trials event.
- 3.2 Archers are responsible for ensuring their scores are correct prior to signing the scorecard.
- 3.3 If an archer withdraws from YOG U.S. Team Trials event for any reason other than the reasons listed below, that athlete may be subject to a Code of Conduct Violation for affecting the outcome of a trials event. The archer may have to appear before the USA Archery Board of Justice for a hearing, which could result in a sanction.
  - 3.3.1 Required military service.
  - 3.3.2 Death in the immediate family. Immediate family is defined as an athlete's partner, or the parents, children, stepchildren, fostered or adopted children, brothers, sisters, grandchildren, or grandparents, of either said athlete or partner.
  - 3.3.3 Serious injury or illness preventing the athlete from competing. Serious injury defined as one of the following:
    - i. injury or illness requiring emergency medical treatment where the athlete is hospitalized for one or more days which prevents an athlete from traveling or competing at the event.
    - ii. injury or illness requiring emergency medical treatment where the athlete is treated by a physician and not allowed to compete due to doctor's orders.
- 3.4 If an archer, for any reason, is unable to participate or continue in the YOG U.S. Team Trials event, the archer shall be deemed to have abandoned the event.
- 3.5 If an archer abandons any portion of the YOG U.S. Team Trials event, the remaining archers will continue to compete with the other remaining archers.
- 3.6 USA Archery rules, policies and procedures will be followed throughout the course of the U.S. Team Trials event.
- 3.7 In the event the 2026 YOG U.S. Team Trials Event cannot be completed as written due to causes beyond control, including but not limited to acts of God, acts of civil or military authority, epidemics, war, terrorist acts, riots, insurrections, fires, explosions, earthquakes, nuclear accidents, floods, power blackouts, volcanic action, other environmental disturbances or unusually severe weather conditions, USA Archery reserves the right to modify the 2026 YOG U.S. Team Trials Event format, schedule, dates and locations to ensure the safety of all participants. USA Archery will make reasonable attempts to finish the selection procedures as written on a later date and notify athletes, if applicable.
  - 3.7.1 In the event the Selection Procedures cannot be completed as written due to causes beyond control, USA Archery will name the Team based on the total cumulative points from the last fully completed end of the 2026 YOG U.S. Team Trials.
    - i. A tie for any position within the top 8 from the combined cumulative score from will be broken by the total number of X's followed by the total number of 10's. Following, if there are still ties within the top 3, the tie(s) will be broken with a single arrow shoot-off.
    - ii. If it becomes necessary for USA Archery to modify the event format, schedule, dates and/or locations due to reasons listed in Section 4 above, USA Archery will notify the athletes of the revised format, schedule, dates and locations as soon as possible.

## APPENDIX C – GLOSSARY

**Contingency** means a future event or circumstance which is possible but cannot be predicted with certainty.

**Delegation Event** means the Youth Olympic Games, Olympic Games, the Olympic Winter Games, the Paralympic Games, the Paralympic Winter Games, the Pan American Games, and the Parapan American Games.

**Force Majeure** means an event or effect that cannot be reasonably anticipated or controlled (e.g., hurricane, tornado, etc.).

**Grievance Procedures** means the process that enables an athlete to file a complaint with the USA Archery or USOPC.

**Jurisdiction** means the power or authority to make decisions and judgments.

**Nominated** means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted to the USOPC by an USA Archery for participation in the Games.

**Protected Competition** means a Delegation Event or a Qualifying Competition.

**Qualifying Competition** means either of the following:

- i. **USA Archery Qualifying Competition:** Any competition or activity organized or approved by USA Archery where the athlete's performance or results are considered in the published selection criteria to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.
- ii. **International Qualifying Competition:** Any international sport competition where (i) athletes represent the United States against athletes representing other nations, (ii) the USA Archery officially designates entrants, as required by the competition organizers, and (iii) athlete results or performance are included in the published criteria to qualify, or be selected, to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.

**Selected** means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted by the USOPC to the LOC at the final submission date, as determined by the LOC.
